

Notes on the December program

The December meeting took place in the Telephone Museum, on Moody Street in Waltham, a short distance from the Embassy Parking Garage. This museum is a private collection of vintage telephones, from the early commercial telephones up through the 1960s. While most of the telephones are American, some were from Great Britain, and some other countries. The high point of the British exhibit is a genuine British Post Office cast iron telephone booth.

The bulk of the exhibit is conventional telephones, but is also includes a good selection of "butt sets", the specialized telephones used by linemen and service technicians.

They also have a small collection of the so called "blue boxes" used to generate tone codes to make telephone codes that bypassed the billing system in use in the 1960's and 1970s. Some people developed these devices by having a person with perfect pitch interpret the frequencies used for dialing. Other people, usually at engineering schools, simply went to the *Bell System Technical Journal* in their Engineering Library, which had a detailed article about the long distance calling system, complete with the tone codes used. Several of my friends

in engineering school took this approach, and I saw the particular article they used. The making of phone calls that bypassed the billing system led to a lively discussion.

- Other pickups will be made on Western MA and Connecticut. Contact NEMES (see email addresses below) for details.






